REMEMBERING OUR CLASSMATES

Sadly, the Class of 1996, like all other Dartmouth classes has faced the loss of beloved classmates. After the passing of Maribel Sanchez in 2017, the Executive Committee discovered that in addition to the fund established to honor Maribel there were three other similar funds managed by the College. As a result we voted to remember our lost classmates through supporting all four memorial funds established in their honor. Additionally, as part of the complete redesign of the webpage we have added an In Memoriam section honoring all 17 classmates who have died. While not all of our lost classmates have funds at the at the College to which we could donate as a class project, we felt that this donation would be a meaningful expression of the love and friendship we feel for ALL '96s who have gone before.

In September 2018, we received a letter from Charlie Devens, that father of Sarah Devens. It read:

“ Dear Dartmouth Class of 1996,

I want to thank you all for making a gift to the Dartmouth Fund in memory of my daughter Sarah. She loved her class and her College. It gave her great friends and teammates during her short life. She loved her sports and excelled in large part due to her teammates and coaches. Our family misses her daily and remembers her in her youth with her enthusiasm and love of life. We started a fund to help those undergraduates needing mental health who could not afford their co-pays and it hopefully helps many with the pressures of academia and athletic life. You are a great Class 1996, we thank you for remembering one of your own.

In response to Mr. Devens' moving words, the Executive Committee, which met during College Officers Weekend in October, voted to continue an annual donation to any memorial fund established at the College in the name of fallen classmates. These donations will be a permanent part of our class project endeavors.

The current Class of 1996 Memorial Funds are:

- Sarah Devens '96 Memorial Fund – Established in memory of Sarah, a tri-varsity athlete in ice hockey, field hockey and lacrosse. Named a captain of all 3 teams, Sarah died in July before our senior year. This endowment is designed to help decrease barriers to seeking treatment for Dartmouth students with mental health issues.
- John Higgins '96 – John Higgins played rugby at Dartmouth and died in August 1998. The fund supports the College's comprehensive athletics and recreational programs with a preference for Intramural Sports.
- Maribel Sanchez '96 Memorial Fund -Maribel was a standout member of the Big Green women's cross country and track and field teams who later returned to Dartmouth as a cross country coach. She died on New Year's Eve 2016 after a long battle with cancer. This endowment will forever support financial aid at Dartmouth, in Maribel's name. *(Continued on p. 4)*

IN MEMORIAM: ANDRE JUNIOR

Andre Junior '96 (affectionately known as Dre) was shot and killed on the afternoon of March 15, 2018. He was 43 years old. Though he lived in Upper Marlboro, MD, Dre was killed while walking in NW Washington, D.C. A 27-year-old man, Robert Edward Green, was soon arrested and charged with First Degree Murder while Armed. Dre leaves behind his wife and best friend, Ericka, and his loving daughter, Ava Junior.

Born and raised in Allendale, South Carolina, Dre was a graduate of Dartmouth College and was loved by fellow students, faculty and administrators alike. This son of Dartmouth had a razor-sharp intellect, beautiful smile and easygoing personality. It's telling that many of his friends from all points of his life remembered him as "good people".

A GoFundMe campaign was started by the Dartmouth Friends of Andre Junior on behalf of Ericka Perry-Junior shortly after Dre's death to raise funds to go into a 529 Education Plan to support their daughter Ava's education. Ericka and Dre had always made Ava's education a priority. The Dartmouth alums who started the campaign wanted to help ensure that Ericka and Dre's dream was realized with Ava continuing along the path that her parents started together. Our fellow classmate Claudius Gayle commented, "While his reach

and the lives he touched extend far beyond, Andre was 1 of I believe just 27 Black men in the Dartmouth College Class of '96, as one of them, I mourn the loss of another. May Eva's [sic] education stand as a testament to her father's legacy."

The original goal was to raise \$10,000, which was achieved in the first 16 hours of the campaign. So the Dartmouth Friends of Andre Junior increased the goal to \$20,000. Dre's community of family, friends, and fellow alumni managed to exceed this goal, ultimately raising \$26,144 from 271 donors over seven months. Wrote the organizers, "On behalf of Andre's family, we would like to thank everyone who supported this campaign. Your contributions and words of support for Andre's family are examples of the power of action and the importance of community. May God continue to watch over and bless Ericka, Ava, the Junior family, and all of you."

"Perhaps it's only fitting, then, that this week is one for yet another transition – my last week with the White House Unit. Although I will continue producing "Nightly News" spots and Special Events at NBC in Washington, I've decided the time has come for me to set aside all the travel, troubleshooting, and transmission pools that have consumed my last decade and a half. There have been a lot of sacrifices made in that time, especially by my family, and I am looking forward to refocusing my energies and reorienting my priorities.

So, this week in June – as in many past – my heart is full. The universe is a funny thing." Alicia traveled with her family this summer instead of for work, and at the end of the summer produced the television coverage of Senator John McCain's Lying in State from the Capitol. "I was honored," she wrote about the experience.
